FEBRUARY

4th Went on a trip around the New Forest with Andy to check the mills out for volume 2 in our new book series. We were lucky (or persistent) enough to be invited into the Fordingbridge Museum (which was officially closed for redecoration) by a lady called Mrs Seaman to look at their collection of mill details and photographs. We found this very useful indeed. Later we went to various mill sites to verify if they were still there. As a piece of industrial archaeology, we also went to see a farm suspension bridge. A suspension bridge in the New Forest - how many of our members know of its existence? Not many, I'll bet, but it can be found on a footpath route across Burgate Farm.
