**Hockley Mill** Concern has been expressed over a press article revealing that the mill's owner has sold his house – but not the mill - and is moving away. The mill is due to be opened to the public by HMG on January 2<sup>nd</sup> 2011.

**Shears Mill, Bishopstoke.** On their website, in the Projects Section, Bishopstoke Parish Council announced the intention to restore the turbines. The page carries three illustrations depicting the mill in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century.
